Waldzell Meeting: The Question of the Meaning of Life

„Business which does not contribute anything to human advancement and welfare is not worth being done, no matter how big a profit it yields“, says US researcher on happiness, Mihály Csikszentmihályi. Together with other thinkers from all over the world, he asks at the „Waldzell Meeting“ the significant question of the meaning of life. For not only the individual but also an increasing number of companies are concerned with it--keyword lastingness.

From 11 to 12 September leaders and decision makers have the unique opportunity to go into the question of meaning, when Melk Abbey invites to the „Global Dialog“: Twelve eminent speakers like Iranian Nobel laureate Shirin Ebadi (peace), Nobel laureate Günter Blobel (medicine), quantum researcher Anton Zeilinger, Carl Djerassi („Father of the Pill“), „Flow“ inventor Mihály Csikszentmihályi, US tenor Thomas Hampson and others will initiate an exchange of thoughts in speeches, closed meetings, and walks in the Abbey's magnificent garden.

With the aim to enable the participants to have truly meaningful conversations and to meet the speakers personally, the number of guests is limited to a maximum of 200. The tuition for the two-day seminar is EUR 2.000 (excl. 20% tax, covering room and board).
